## Chemistry Olympiad 2019

In March, five students competed in the Local Chemistry Olympiad Exam. Of the approximately 100 students who took the local exam, Rachel Westley and Alyssa Prendergast placed 5th and 10th place overall and were chosen to compete in the National Chemistry Olympiad Exam administered at State College Area High School in April. This seven-hour exam determines the top 20 most promising young chemists. The three-part exam included two laboratory experiments, 60 multiple choice questions on organic, physical and traditional high school chemistry as well as eight in depth essay questions. The United States has participated internationally in this event since 1984. It is sponsored by the American Chemical Society founded in 1876 and holds a Congressional Charter.

## High School Receives STEM Grant

The Hollidaysburg Area School District received a $\$ 9980$ STEM grant from the Toshiba America Foundation (TAF). These funds will provide wireless sensors and other classroom materials that will be used by high school physics students for a project called Science is for Sharing.

Using sensors that interface with student Chromebooks and computers, students participating in the project will learn how to design simple demonstrations that help correct common misconceptions related to science. Hands-on activities in the classroom will help students enrich their own understanding as they develop ideas for illustrating these concepts to others. The project is the result of a proposal submitted by high school physics teacher Paul Longwell.

Toshiba America Foundation's grants fund projects designed by individual classroom teachers. This "di-rect-to-teacher" approach brings immediate results. Teachers are able to change the way they teach Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) subjects because the grant supports equipment for hands-on experiments and inquiry-based approaches to the curriculum. Toshiba America Foundations believes that STEM is a lot more fun than just reading a textbook. The grants provide teachers with the tools they need to be more effective educators. The grants make the classroom a more exciting place for both teachers and students.

Founded in 1990 with support from Toshiba Corporation and the Toshiba America Group Companies, Toshiba America Foundation (TAF) is a non-profit grant making organization dedicated to helping classroom teachers make STEM learning fun and successful for K to 12 students in U.S. schools. ## Project Diversity

This year was the inaugural year for a new organization at the high school designed to allow high school students to confront issues related to diversity and acceptance. The organization was named "Project Diversity!" and the students who participated were dubbed "Diversity Ambassadors." The first event for these students in grades nine through twelve was a training held in December with the Anti-Defamation League. Thirty-five students participated in a half-day workshop that included discussions of the history of hate in America and activities designed to help students understand ways to challenge hate and promote greater understanding and acceptance.

In February, ambassadors teamed up with Special Olympics and the PIAA as the high school participated in a Unified Bocce Ball League with Central High School in Martinsburg and Bellwood High School. Teams in the league were made up of eight students from each school. Our team consisted of Nathan Gardner, Brendan Houp, Mitchell Kosko-Blyler, Maria Murphy, James Roberts, Kendrick Imler, Noah Anneski, Dylan Eckard, and Tanner Stewart. Mr. Clark McCready was the coach. The athletes competed in two dual meets and in the final championship meet hosted in the Golden Tiger gym. Our team finished in second place, and the athletes received silver medals. Many high school students came out to cheer the team on, and great friendships were built.

In April, teams of ambassadors visited the junior high during PSSA testing week to work with the ninth- grade students on a series of six stations that gave them the opportunity to explore ideas related to gender equality, racism, language, global-social awareness, privilege, and other issues young people encounter every day. The high school students spent two hours working with the younger students, engaging them in activities and conversations, to hopefully build relationships that will carry on beyond this single encounter.

In May, teams of ambassadors visited the sixth graders at each of the district's elementary schools where they engaged the students in activities designed to help them better understand the dangers of stereotyping, problems with unequal resources, and why exclusion and bullying are so harmful.

We are thrilled with the work we were able to achieve in this our first year, and we look forward to building on this foundation to work toward ideals of acceptance, friendship and ultimately, peace.

MATHCOUNTS is national middle school mathematics competition that builds problem-solving skills and fosters achievement through competition. In each level of the competition, four students comprise the team and all students compete as individuals. Each level of the competition is comprised of four rounds-Sprint, Target, Team and Countdown Round. The rounds are all unique in the number of math questions, amount of time to complete the contest, and if the use of a calculator is permitted.

## Junior High STEM Night

In February, the junior high hosted a STEM night for students in grades 7-9. Students were introduced to four very interesting areas of technology, the first of which was flying and programming drones. Next, students headed to the other side of the gymnasium to the virtual reality section. In this section, students were able to wear virtual reality headsets. While wearing the headsets, students were able to take "tours" of the international space station and an underwater coral reef.


The third area of technology students were introduced to was how 3D printing works. Students headed down to the STEM wing of the junior high to observe these 3D printers in action. They were able to see what the "onshape" program was, how the printer melted filament through their extruders and how the $\mathrm{X}, \mathrm{Y}$, and Z axis were utilized to make printed objects.

The night ended up with students utilizing Makey Makeys. At this station, they learned basic circuitry with various objects that included playdoh, bananas, lead and paper. They finished the evening using their newfound skills to control video games.


## Interactive Maker Projects

As a year-end exercise, students in Mrs. Erickson's period 2 world history class utilized Roger Wagner's HyperDuino ${ }^{\mathrm{TM}}$ maker kits to showcase what they learned about an ancient civilization that was studied sometime during the school year.

The goal of the field trip was to promote sustainability-focused activities using content curriculum and provide a school/community partnership that enriches and enhances the educational opportunities for the students involved. ## Mobile Ag Ed Science Lab

What on Earth was this huge, strange trailer parked out behind Foot of Ten Elementary School for two weeks in October? It was the Mobile Ag Ed Science Lab, supported by the PA Dept. of Agriculture, visiting our school. The lab is a 40 -foot mobile trailer that houses 12 workstations at which students can learn about and work through the Scientific Method while being exposed to important facts about agriculture, which is Pennsylvania's leading industry. We were able to secure the funding to host the lab for a full two-week period thanks to grants from the Hollidaysburg Area School District Foundation and the PA Friends of Agriculture Foundation.

In the two-week time period, every student and classroom teacher in the building was able to visit and work in the lab under the direction of a certified teacher provided by the lab. This translates to 558 kindergarten to sixth-grade students. Additionally, 253 intermediate students got to perform a second experiment in the lab.

It is very rare that a school can procure the lab for a two-week period so that all students get to benefit from its visit. The Mobile Ag Ed Science Lab has to be the best learning opportunity in all of our area when it comes to engaging students. With over 30 curricular choices aligned with the PDE State Standards, students did everything from learning how to identify insects to making glue from milk and plastic from corn.


Students claimed in their follow-up writings: "It's one of the best ways to learn science;" "We really had to think to find the source of contamination;" and "I felt like a real scientist!"

## C.W. Longer Innovation Lab Opens

Charles W. Longer (CWL) Elementary staff have been working hard to get the CWL Innovation Lab up and rolling. Teachers are now able to take their classes to the Innovation Lab and work on a variety of STEM related projects. In November, Mrs. Alexa Ritchey's fourth-grade students utilized the Innovation Lab to investigate circuits. Using the Snap Circuit kits, students were able to learn about circuits through hands-on exploration and reading related texts. They were then able to work with a partner to build and design working circuits. Lights were flashing, sirens were ringing, and learning was taking place!

JUDY WARD, class of 1977. Ward is a registered nurse, as well as a former small business owner, and development professional and wellness coordinator for Ward Transport and Logistics. Ward was elected to represent residents of Blair, Cumberland, Franklin, Fulton and Huntingdon counties in the Pennsylvania Senate on Nov. 6, 2018, after serving two terms representing the interests of local communities in the House of Representatives. She is married to Bill Ward.

FRED MARSCHAK, class of 1963. Fred spent nine years in Hollidaysburg as planetarium director where he was named Outstanding Secondary Educator in America in 1975. In 1977, Fred and his wife Nancy moved to Santa Barbara, California.

For the next 38 years, he worked his way from astronomy lab instructor to professor of Earth and planetary sciences at Santa Barbara City College (SBCC). In the late 1970s and early 1980s, he earned two master's degrees at the University of California in Santa Barbara.

He created the astronomy lab at SBCC, which now serves 800 students per year and he grew the astronomy lecture classes from 30 students to about 2,000. Fred received the SBCC Faculty Excellence Award and was honored by having a new 20 -inch research grade telescope named after him at the Santa Barbara Museum of Natural History. After 48 years of teaching, Fred (and Nancy) have retired to Homewood at Martinsburg.

He still lectures regularly at Homewood and the Hollidaysburg Area Public Library, as well as to scouts, schools and other groups. He is currently volunteering with the Hollidaysburg Area Senior High School planetarium.
