

Mathematics Competition

The American Mathematics Competitions (AMC) 10 and 12 are the first in a series of competitions that eventually lead to the International Mathematical Olympiad. Students at Hollidaysburg Area Junior and Senior High participated in the Mathematical Association of America's American Mathematics Competitions (MAA AMC). The MAA AMC program leads the nation in strengthening the mathematical capabilities of the next generation of problem-solvers. The competitions prepare students for future careers in STEM fields and help positive attitudes towards analytical thinking and mathematics. The AMC 10 is for students in tenth grade and below and covers the high school curriculum up to tenth grade.

Ten students in the Hollidaysburg Area Junior High School participated in the AMC 10 contest this school year. The highest scoring student was William Zhu, second place was Samuel Blescia, and third place was Felix Xu. William Zhu's score qualified him to participate in the American Invitational Mathematics Examination (AIME). This is an extreme honor for an eighth-grader to qualify for the AIME contest.

The AMC 12 covers the entire high school curriculum including trigonometry, advanced algebra, and advanced geometry, but excludes calculus. This year, Emily Zhu, twelfth-grade, placed in the top 5% of students in the U.S. who took the AMC 12, making her a qualifier for the American Invitational Mathematics Exam (AIME).

This marks two years in a row that Emily and William have participated in the AIME. Congratulations, Emily and William!

The Relay for Life Olympic Field Day competition was held on April 29 at the senior high school, Tiger Stadium, and surrounding fields. Over 400 students and faculty either participated or volunteered their time to raise funds for The American Cancer Society. The students participated in games throughout the campus and ended their day by taking part in a choreographed dance and a luminaria walk to honor survivors and remember those who lost their battle with cancer. This year, we had 35 teams participate and raised almost \$5000 for The American Cancer Society. Team Kazakhstan won the event this year, earning an ice cream sundae party for their efforts.



Athletic Mural

The high school art students planned, designed, and created an athletic mural to honor our athletes at Hollidaysburg. The students received a grant from the Hollidaysburg Area School District Foundation and Southern Alleghenies Museum of Art to complete this twenty-foot-long mural. The student artists combined efforts with artist-in-residence Deb Bunnell to make this project happen. Inspiration for this mural was French Impressionism, color theory, and the artwork of Georges Seurat. After many hours of painting and dotting, the masterpiece was completed and is showcased in the hallway leading to the gymnasium to celebrate our athletic program at Hollidaysburg.



Esports Team

The Hollidaysburg Esports Team completed their first season in the TEC High School Esports League sponsored by The Esport Company and St. Francis University. The league is made up of teams from central and western Pennsylvania. The league currently has competitions in Valorant, Overwatch and Rocket League and has two divisions for each game. The Tigers placed 1st in Overwatch Division II, 3rd in Rocket League Division II and 4th in Rocket League Division I. This was an impressive showing for the inaugural Esports season in the TEC League where the majority of the teams were in their fourth season. The Hollidaysburg Esports team is currently made up of 27 students and is guided by Esports Director Adam Walstrom, Esports Head Coach Vinny Bonanno and Assistant Coach Doug Spaar.


German 3 Students Provide Fun Activities for Classmates

Chemistry Olympiad

On March 28, Katie Burke, Neo Chen, Seddy Clapper, Collin Edgell, Matthew Hargittai, Kendra Jones, Paul Rose, and Gavin Ross competed in the Local Chemistry Olympiad Exam. The top scores for our school were Collin Edgell, first place and Matthew Hargittai, second place. Based on their performance on this exam, they were qualifiers for the National Chemistry Olympiad. This exam will determine the top 20 most promising young chemists in the nation. The test included questions on organic, physical, and traditional high school chemistry. The United States has participated internationally in this event since 1984. The event is sponsored by the American Chemical Society that was founded in 1876.

AP Art and Design Student Show

Holiday of the Arts

The high school art students worked hard to bring back Holiday of the Arts in full spirit for C. W. Longer Elementary School this year. Eighty-five art students helped to plan and prepare holiday crafts for Kindergarten through sixth-grade students. Each elementary student enjoyed the day learning about art and creating two handmade crafts to take home to their family.



American Council of Teachers of Russian (ACTR) Olympiada of Spoken Russian

The ACTR Olympiada of Spoken Russian is an annual national competition where high school students have the opportunity to demonstrate their Russian language knowledge with other students of Russian and converse with native Russian speakers. Students compete in three commissions—Oral Communication, Area Studies and Reading: Texts and Poems.

This year the competition was held virtually for the Area Studies and Reading: Texts and Poems. The Oral Communication commission required students to meet with Russian professors via Zoom and answer questions. Madison Riva and Erika Salisbury competed in the Level 1 commission. Both were required to create videos of their poetry reading and presentations to submit to the judges by the end of March. On April 20, both met Russian professors via Zoom and had the opportunity to paint Easter eggs with other students in a virtual setting. Congratulations to both young ladies on their achievements in this very difficult competition.

Madison Riva received a Bronze medal. Erika Salisbury received a Silver medal.

Foreign Language in the Community

French, German, and Spanish Clubs have been busy this year, creating lessons and teaching elementary school students about the different cultures.







Le club de français-French Club

French Club has taught lessons this year at C.W. Longer and Foot of Ten Elementary schools. The senior high French students taught the elementary students how to say colors in French and about the famous example of Gothic architecture at Notre Dame Cathedral. They created "stained glass" out of tissue paper to hang up in their windows at home and played a fun Kahoot game to show what they learned.

In March, French Club students went to C. W. Longer to teach about Mardi Gras with Spanish Club. A variety of classes participated in reviewing French colors, discussing Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday), and traditions during this holiday. The students received snacks to represent the King's Cake. Of course, no French activity is complete without a Mardi Gras mask souvenir. Students had fun making their own with feathers, beads, green and purple designs and sequins.

El Club de español - Spanish Club

In October, Spanish Club went to C. W. Longer and taught a lesson about Día de los Muertos/Day of the Dead to the 5th grade group. Students learned about this special tradition in México that included Altar de Ofrendas, comida/food, traditional makeup and clothing, parades, music, and how Mexicans celebrate this time before Halloween. Since elementary students were having a culture day of their own learning about Disney's COCO movie, the Spanish students taught the younger kids about Alebrijes,

which are spirit animals in the Mexican afterlife. Students learned about the different kinds of traditions associated with this holiday, key phrases and completed a Kahoot and Quizlet game to test their knowledge. Additionally, students made their own Alebrijes and calaveras (sugar skulls) pictures.

In March, Spanish/French Clubs taught students at C. W. Longer about Carnaval/Lent and Mardi Gras. Carnaval is celebrated in the different regions in Spanish-speaking countries and most famously in Brazil in South America. Students enjoyed learning about the parades, traditions, and colorful clothing. They learned Spanish colors and how to create papel picado – a paper cutting activity that resembles confetti/snowflakes.

Deutscher Klub - German Club

Throughout the spring, German Club students have made various trips to the elementary schools. They worked with 5th grade at Frankstown, 1st and 6th grade at C. W. Longer, and 6th grade at Foot of Ten. Elementary students were introduced to to the children's song "Schnappi, das kleine Krokodil" and an Oktoberfest song "Fliegerlied." Lessons included basic vocabulary through song and dance, games, and interactive activities such as hot potato and word match ups. These activities helped the senior high students strengthen their leadership and presentational skills and helped the elementary students develop an appreciation of and interest in learning foreign languages. The lessons were a lot of fun for all students involved.

Our clubs hope this encourages students to take what they learn, teach others, appreciate languages, embrace cultural differences and look forward to taking a foreign language in junior high.

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Leadership Blair County Youth

Leadership Blair County Youth, financially supported by the Chamber Foundation, is a program that works to develop the leadership potential of tenthgrade students of high schools in Blair County, as well as educate the students on the county's heritage, culture and workforce opportunities. Four of our sophomore students, Maxwell Baronner, Shelby Beauchamp, Ava Dixon, and Mary McKeegan were accepted into and participated in the program. All four students successfully completed the program and graduated on May 11, 2022.

In National preliminary play, the students had a 4-2 record. This qualified the team for National playoffs! MATHCOUNTS®

The Junior High MATHCOUNTS® competition team had a very successful school year. The following students participated in the MATHCOUNTS® Chapter Competition: eighth graders Felix Xu, William Zhu, Stanley Zheng, Sammi Heikinen, and seventh-graders Jenna Zelem, Tyler Rodgers, and Kate Steiner. Results of the chapter competition were as follows: Felix Xu placed first, William Zhu placed second and Stanley Zheng placed 4th. These students advanced to the state MATHCOUNTS® competition held on March 19. The Hollidaysburg Team earned first place honors at the chapter competition. Likewise, the students were extremely successful at the State MATHCOUNTS® competition. For the first time ever, a student from Hollidaysburg – Felix Xu – placed in the Top Ten individual students, earning the opportunity to participate in the countdown round. The countdown round is a competition where two students individually compete against each other to be the fastest to correctly answer questions. The student who answers the most correct out of three questions advances to the next participant who is another student from the top ten. William Zhu placed 11th at the state competition and Stanley Zheng placed 53rd. There were 106 students who participated in the state MATHCOUNTS® competition.

PennCFL Stock Market Challenge

Under the guidance of Stephanie Gutshall and Nicci Stultz, several 5th and 6th grade students at C.W. Longer, Foot of Ten, and Frankstown participated in the statewide Stock Market Challenge sponsored by the Pennsylvania Council on Financial Literacy (PennCFL). For ten weeks, these students learned how to invest in stocks, make trades, analyze markets, and build an individual stock market portfolio. Foot of Ten earned 9th place in the statewide elementary division. Maya Grinberg, a 6th grade student at Foot of Ten, earned the highest portfolio total of our participating students, earning this recognition.

PaTTAN Grant

Together, the team members participated in four days of training over the summer to learn instructional routines for foundational reading skills, comprehension, and vocabulary.

Throughout the school year, this group of teachers received additional support and training from Pattan in regards to improving reading outcomes and improving problem solving strategies for Tier 2 and Tier 3 supports. As part of the team's efforts and results at middle of the year testing, they were asked to participate in a podcast hosted by Pattan and to serve as a model school site. In May, the team presented the data collected on reading achievement for first graders to the other school districts who also participated in their cohort.

Keystone String Fest

On March 29, a group of Hollidaysburg Area Junior High orchestra students participated in the Keystone String Fest at Altoona High School. The students had a great time rehearsing with guest conductor, Krista Kriel, from the Harrisburg Youth Symphony. Sense and Sensibility


